Peter Lang will present work on the Corviale, a one-kilometer-long building located outside of Rome, conducted by the research group Stalker/ON that Lang participates in. Lang will premiere videos by Armin Linke, Laurent Malone, and Francesco Careri, as well as discuss other projects undertaken at this site during the last two years. He will explore the impact that this work has had on the polemics of this residential megastructure, and reflect on similar controversial situations occurring outside of Paris and New Orleans.

**Peter Lang** is Assistant Professor at the Department of Architecture at Texas A&M based at the Santa Chiara Study Center in Tuscany, where he teaches architectural design and theory. A Fulbright recipient, he holds a Bachelor in Architecture from Syracuse University and a Ph.D. in history and urbanism from New York University. He is an active member of Stalker/ON, the international urban research group based in Rome ([www.osservatorionomade.net](http://www.osservatorionomade.net)). He has most recently helped coordinate the installation of "Corviale" for the exhibition *DynamiCity - Tactics for a Changing Metropolis* at the NAI in Rotterdam (March 25 - June 11 2006). Currently he is completing work on the forthcoming Skira publication *Stalker: The Unauthorized History* as well a book on his collages: *Crashlands, an illustrated manifesto on cities and architecture in the Third Millennium* (2006, Map Book Publishers, Hong Kong). Peter Lang lives and works in Europe.

Lecturers will be from the fields of architecture, urban planning, and urban design, but also public policy, public art, philosophy, film, and journalism.
